Of this surplus, £3,794 was passed on immediately to FECA member organisations and the balance retained by FECA for future grants to other organisations. The main beneficiaries from the Festival were Ladybird Pre-school, Firs House and Telegraph Street Patient Participation Group, Willingham Youth Trust and the Landbeach Tithe Barn Trust. Including the additional amounts raised directly by FECA member organisations over the weekend, that means nearly £10,000 was raised for charities and community organisations in the Fen Edge.

100 AND STILL GOING STRONG

It was the creation of 'the patch' that brought about the **Fen Edge News** – now celebrating the 100th issue. Over the years those termly magazines (New Year, Spring/Summer and Autumn) have covered the happenings and history of the five villages.

There had always been a newsletter of sorts issued by Cottenham Village College since it opened on 7 November 1963 to promote community education and life-long learning. These information sheets were usually 'roneoed' (quite a useful Scrabble word) and run off by hand before being stapled and delivered.

Things started to change in the early 1980s with cover designs and printed issues then, in 1985, a Cottenham and District Community Association was formed after a meeting at the college attended by many organisations from the villages.

The purpose was to provide a forum for the exchange of ideas concerning education, recreation and information, and to increase the involvement of members of the public in community activities in the College and elsewhere, wrote W P Kirkman, chair of the education group. And it succeeded. In issue no 6, 1986, Bruce Kent, secretary of the Community Association, announced that the finances were in a healthy state after a Ceilidh, Fun Run, inter-village walks, Playschemes, local history fayre, Saturday morning markets and New Year's Eve party.

Members were invited to hire the new school minibus and to get reduced rates for room hire at CVC and could apply for grants. Early recipients of the funds generated included the College (£1,000 towards a new litho printing machine), Cottenham Theatre Workshop (£400 for new lights in the College hall, where plays, pantos and concerts are staged) and the Volleyball Club (£40 for new balls).

Jenny Kay, the instigator of so much in Cottenham (Summer School, CareCar, mobile warden scheme, the Toy Library), was quick to spot anyone who could use a computer. When she was chair of the Community Association in 1985/6 she found Barbara Graves. This led to Barbara editing the Fen Edge News for some years.

The Fen Edge Patch was given its name by Martin Doubleday who ran Community Education in the 1980s.

Geoff Redhead – still a FECA trustee today – succeeded Martin and became the life-long learning coordinator, taking on the role of editing the Newsletter which in 1994 became the Fen Edge News, six months after the Association changed its name to the Fen Edge Community Association.

Mike Smith came to live in Cottenham in 1986 and was associated with community activities from the start. He was on the committee when the Association changed its

name to the Fen Edge Community Association and, with Emma Green and Wane Borg, was one of those behind the establishment of the Fen Edge Festival which began in 2005 and has run every two years since on Cottenham Village Green. In 2007 one of the members of the Festival committee was Neil Gough, now chair of FECA.

Far too many people have been connected to the 100 issues to name - from all those who had the role of chair, or served on the committee, to those who compiled and submitted articles to keep villagers aware of what goes on in their world and to the volunteers (including the Scouts) who did the distribution. Among the names who will have been involved (and not mentioned above) are John Auckland, Roger and Marilyn Daw, Beryl Hayward, Mike Herbert, Steve Howie, Alan Leeks, Deborah Loveluck, Christine Munns, Eric Smith, Brenda Ward, Benji Warwick and Willie Whybray.

Despite changing fortunes in budget allocations the community education programme thrives under Janet Drinkwater and team, providing free as well as paid-for courses. The Summer School is successfully self-funded, and continues to attract hundreds each year. And the role of the Community Association should be given due recognition. Ruth Rogers, chair in 1993, wrote in issue 23: at a time when economic difficulties touch virtually all our lives, it is refreshing to encounter the attitude of CA members who are prepared to commit considerable time and effort in running popular and successful local events. Yes volunteers. Without them there would never have been 100 issues keeping villagers in touch with each other. That's worth celebrating.




Lynda is joined in Cottenham by her husband Martyn,

A PLANT SURVIVAL GUIDE TO CHRISTMAS

Since decorating homes with plants and foliage goes way back into the depths of time, I thought it might be an idea to look at the whole thing from the plant's perspective. Helping things to survive indoors means that you have to have an idea of what the plant would usually like. If it comes from cool, dry conditions, standing it in a dark corner in a plant saucer full of water may be a bad idea. On the other hand, if plants like humid, dappled light, a bright windowsill over a nice warm radiator is an equally bad idea. I know. I've done both

Generally, the rules are the same for all indoor plants. The trick is to keep plants where they can enjoy their own micro climate, surrounded by moist air that won't dry them out, with enough light to make them feel happy.

Whatever the geographic origin of the plant, it will be aware of the low light levels at this time of year. It will be growing very slowly, or not growing at all, in which case it will require just enough moisture to not dry out. Have a small sprayer handy to mist the leaves, using water at room temperature. (How do you like a cold shower?) The trick is put the plant into a sympathetic position (remember the radiator) and try, if you can, to mimic the natural conditions that a plant would have.

Having mentioned safety, it may be worth highlighting one or two things.

It is worth assuming that all plants are, to a certain extent, toxic unless you know otherwise. Ivy is an irritant. Ask anybody who has had to prune the stuff. Berries can be toxic, and likely to drop from plants to where little fingers may pick them up. Use your common sense and judgement, and all should be well. Remember, these plants have all been approved for sale, and the risks, though present, are low.

So, what will we find being bought at this time of year? We'll look at just a few....

Christmas Trees. Choose your tree well. I'll assume that you know about shape, type and size. When you get it home, it will be thirsty. If it has a sawn base, stand it somewhere in a bucket of water until you're ready to put it up. Make sure that you have either a bucket of soil or sand that will take water, or get a tree stand that has a reservoir. It's amazing how much water a tree will use. Check it daily, and top up if it needs it. If you've electrics around the tree, it would be wise to pull out the plug and move

the important bits out of the way. Water is a great conductor of electricity. If it is a rooted tree, keep the roots damp; heel it into a spot in your garden until you're ready for it. Stand it in a bucket, and the above watering rules apply.

Cut greenery such as holly and ivy is nice to decorate with, and will last a fair while without much attention, provided that it's not too near a heat source. Foliage can add a great deal of ambience to a room, particularly in the form of garlands, where it can be combined with dried fruit, seed pods and whatever else you fancy. However, be cautious about mixing any sort of decoration around other fire sources such as candles If you want cut flowers, either use oasis (foam available from florists) to keep them hydrated, or keep the vase topped up. Cheap lemonade makes a good plant food. Yes, really, I haven't tried cola. Yet.

Poinsettias tend to put in an appearance about now. In my early days, they were big bushy things that came home, dropped their leaves and raced each other to see who could be deadest by Christmas. Nowadays, they come in varying sizes, with bracts of varying colours, and still race each other to see who can be deadest by Christmas. Give them a moderate temperature, around low sixties to mid seventies centigrade, plenty of light but no cold draughts and they'll be happy. Mist their leaves now and then with tepid water and the leaves should stay where the plant intended. You can make them stay alive, there's no mystique, and they make nice tender perennial shrubs in the garden in summer. You almost certainly won't get red bracts next year, so buy a new plant next year. Being basically a euphorbia, the sap is irritant, so dispose of any broken bits and dropped leaves.

The **Winter Cherry** is covered in red berries, we'd like it to stay that way, wouldn't we? Don't be put off having this little plant around. It enjoys the same conditions as its friend the poinsettia, and the two together make a nice arrangement. Keep it just damp, and don't feed it. Another survivor, it will tolerate being planted in the garden. Pick up any dropped berries as they are mildly poisonous.

will bloom for ages, and will do it again if you look after it. In common with all plants living indoors, they hate draughts.

Bulbs are popular at this time of the year; they hold the promise of spring. If you're potting them up, use bulb fibre. Try paperwhite narcissi as well as hyacinths. They can bloom by Christmas. Keep bulbs in a cool, light place and moist, not wet. When they're done, put them in the garden if you wish. They may not do much the following year, but they will recover.

Now, something else for you to do. Join a gardening club. Why? Because information about the above, and all sorts of other things, is always freely available from the other members of the group. I know that there are online chatrooms and forums, but you can't beat the pleasure of being with a group of other people who will be more than happy to share their knowledge with you. Now is the time to join. Make it a new year's resolution. I belong to Cottenham Gardeners' club, and I hope that maybe I'll see you there.





FECA IN LANDBEACH

THE LANDBEACH SOCIETY

Landbeach in the early 1970s could almost be described as a village in turmoil. So much was changing – many surrounding villages were suffering from haphazard development, the structure of local government was being reorganised, a number of the medieval and thatched properties in the village were in disrepair, the village school had just closed, there were only two small shops and a post office, and a limited bus service.

As a consequence a number of villagers came together to form The Landbeach Society in 1972. This had the express purpose, amongst other things, of promoting high standards of planning and architecture; and securing the preservation, protection, development and improvement of features of historic or public interest in Landbeach. The practical implementation of these aims has included making significant representations to the local authorities on housing developments and roads, and opposing proposals in unsuitable locations. Members of the Society have played an important role in planning extensions to the Village Hall over the years. They were also involved in the establishment and creation of the Recreation Ground. organising the children's play equipment, and tree planting in the verges. In part because of this atmosphere of care and concern for the conservation and appearance of the village, a number of historic cottages, farm buildings and former pubs have been restored by their owners and made into comfortable homes with modern amenities. This has been achieved while retaining much of the original appearance and charm of the buildings. A major activity began in 1975 when a lease was given to the Society for the medieval Tithe Barn, which was in a poor state of repair. Much fundraising by way of Open Garden events, concerts and other activities, together with grants, allowed thatching and repairs to be carried out; but not without major problems in finding the right straw and thatcher at the right time. Eventually the Barn was put in reasonable order, and was used to host a variety of social events. However, by 2014 the Society could no longer support the maintenance then required and had to surrender the lease. Fortunately a charity. Tithe Barn Trust, has now been established to restore and develop the use of this historic building. More generally, the Landbeach Society continues to hold regular monthly meetings to hear talks and make visits to places of interest. It continues to monitor local building plans, and now particularly the New Town development



on the former Waterbeach Airfield, that could have a significant impact on this village particularly because of the transport implications.

The Landbeach Society is for anyone interested in the history of the village, its place within the region and in protecting the environment of the village. We hold a series of monthly meetings to which all are welcome. The cost of membership is £3.00 per annum and entrance to the talks in the Village Hall is £3.50. You do not need to be a member to attend the talks. Dates and topics of our meetings are shown on pages 7 & 8.

The Tithe Barn Trust aims to save and sympathetically restore the Grade II Listed Tithe Barn for community use, but we need you to help us. We estimate we'll need 5 tonnes of locally sourced hand drawn Longstraw to rethatch the roof. The Tithe Barn Trust believes the medieval Tithe barn, with thatched roof, brick threshing floor and timber granary, to be unique to Cambridgeshire and even of national significance. It is one of the few Tithe Barns in the country still standing next to its medieval rectory. Over 90% of Tithe Barns in the UK have been converted and their historic features are being lost forever. Sadly, the Landbeach Tithe Barn is in a poor condition and deteriorating. How to find the Tithe Barn

Kissing gate entrance is opposite No 2 Waterbeach Road, Landbeach, Cambridge, CB25 9FA. Walk along the grassed track by the hedge. Free road parking or no.9 Stagecoach bus stops near Cockfen Lane.

RECORDING WILDLIFE

Whenever you are out and about, especially on foot or bicycle, there is always a good chance of spotting an interesting animal or plant if you keep your eyes and ears open. Recent surveys suggest that our children are becoming less aware of the wildlife around them but in my experience (and age) I find that they are by far the best 'spotters'. Set them (and you) the task of spotting and identifying a bird, insect, mammal, amphibian, reptile or wild flower each day or week. Records can be shared through 'i-record' (www.brc.ac.uk/irecord/) or send them to **Friends** of **Worts Meadow** (FOWM).

More difficult to see is the myriad of wildlife that lurks underwater in every pond and lake. One of

the best ways to find out about this fascinating variety of animals, is to join a pond dipping session. Just on your doorstep, you can join Friends of Worts Meadow in Landbeach where we run a pond dipping event each year in late August (open to all). This year 15 adults and 10 children had great fun squelching about in wellies, dipping our nets in to see what we could catch. It was too late in the year for tadpoles and baby newts, but we found many different sorts of water beetles, tiny clam-like pea mussels (Pisidium), water snails, nymphs (young) of damselflies and mayflies and even small leeches! Before starting to dip in and muddy the water, we stood quietly to 'watch and see'. There in front of our eyes were water boatmen busily 'rowing' to and fro with their extra-long rear legs. Just dipping a jam jar of water from near the edge scooped up hundreds of tiny (planktonic) animals. Later, a closer look under a low power microscope in our temporary gazebo base camp, revealed these were semi-transparent water fleas and copepods - tiny crustaceans (shrimps and crabs are also crustaceans).

Birds are also sometimes quite difficult to spot especially amongst woodland foliage but they give themselves away with their varied and beautiful songs. With our expert bird-listener (Phil Clark) on hand, we recorded 23 species during our bird walk in May and managed to see most of them – with a lot of guidance.

If you do visit Worts Meadow and Bourne Wood (and I hope you will) then look out for our waterproof recording book tied onto the gate at the wood entrance, past the main meadow entrance along Cockfen Lane. Tell us there what you saw. In January we will be planning our 2018 events. Look for them here in Fen Edge News, What's on in Landbeach, our Facebook page and on village noticeboards.

FRIENDS OF WORTS MEADOW

This is a constituted group of volunteers who help with the practical management of Worts Meadow Local Nature Reserve. It is free to join. Our open events provide the chance to learn about and enjoy the wildlife of the site and help with recording. Look out for our planned 'Bioblitz' in summer 2018. Our first meeting of 2018 will be on Tuesday 9^{th} January at 7.15pm in the Village Hall. At this meeting we will be setting the budget and precept for the following financial year. Please do come along.

Community Speedwatch

A working group of residents has got together to explore ways of tackling the concerns about traffic and public transport provision that were raised during the Parish Council's Neighbourhood Plan consultation. The main themes that came out of the consultation were the need to:

- Change the character and speed of traffic throughout the village (HGVs causing noise at all times and shaking houses, general speeding and aggressive driving);
- Improve pedestrian safety (narrow pavements and proximity to passing vehicles, lack of pedestrian crossings, general pollution);

- Improve public transport links especially with Cambridge (faster, covering all the village, links to other transport e.g. guided busway and rail);
- Improve cycle links (with Oakington and Waterbeach as well as the crossing on Histon Rd).

One way to tackle speeding (we are investigating others) is to gather factual evidence through Speedwatch. You might recall that there was an active Speedwatch group. Unfortunately, the volunteers in that group were not able to carry on. It would be great if Speedwatch could be reactivated. It is not an onerous commitment, you can choose whether or not to join a particular Speedwatch event, it is always during daylight and you would receive training on how to use the equipment. The more people who join Speedwatch the more events can take place. The more evidence that can be gathered the sooner we can achieve our goal of making Cottenham a more pleasant place for pedestrians and cyclists.



WATERBEACH PARISH COUNCIL

Planning Issues

We now have a dedicated page for the Urban and Civic Planning Application: www.waterbeach.org.uk/opus/ opus285.html.We understand that an application from RLW Estates, for the area between the barracks and the river, is likely to be submitted in early 2018. RLW are holding an exhibition at the Salvation Army Hall, 7 Station Road, Waterbeach, CB25 9HT on Friday November 24th: 15:30 - 19:30 and Saturday November 25th: 10:00 - 15:00. We understand they will be putting a flyer round the village and also notifying the surrounding Parish Councils. When planning permission is granted for new developments, money is often provided by the developer to enhance village facilities. These are known as Section 106 funds. The new developments on Bannold Road as well as others will be providing quite substantial amounts and the Parish Council is looking for ideas for expanding and improving village facilities using this money. We have already allocated funds towards improvement of the Recreation Ground Car Park and the sports pavilion as well as possible improvements to Tillage Hall and the Library Access Point. We are also asking residents for their ideas. At the moment we expect getting on for £250,000 will become available in the not too distant future so we have a real opportunity to enhance our village amenities. There are some eligibility criteria involved – for instance, the money comes in under three broad headings: sports, indoor community facilities and children's play equipment. We are encouraging Waterbeach residents to contact us (council@waterbeach.org.uk) if they have suggestions they would like to see considered.

Neighbourhood Plan

We have secured some grant funding to help us move on to produce an Area Character Assessment. We also have Summary Objectives on which you can comment:

 A housing growth strategy tailored to the needs of Waterbeach Village and reflecting the current built form and rural setting

- Sensitive development which protects and enriches the landscape and built setting
- Sustaining and improving local facilities for the benefit of existing and new residents. Including shops, leisure/ recreational, health and education
- Strengthening and supporting economic activity which provides employment opportunities for local people
- Support transport improvements which prioritise pedestrian, cycling and public modes of transport
- Protect greenspace, the landscape and support nature conservation
- Involve local people on an ongoing basis in the process of plan-making and review



FECA IN WILLINGHAM

On Feast Saturday and Sunday we had three exhibitions in the village; one run by the Octagon art group, one by the photography club, and the library hosted an historical perspective of Willingham with material from the 'Old Willingham' website and material from the Cambridgeshire Collection. The photography and art displays were as outstanding as ever and one is reminded that there are so many talented people in the village. The photos of 'Old Willingham' raise unusual emotions for me. I have lived here for just fourteen years but this is the first place in which I have felt a real sense of belonging, partly due to a knowledge of its history. It was, and still is, a wonderful community.

On Saturday night Willingham School Association ran a ceilidh. By the end, like most ceilidhs, everyone was hot, happy and slightly confused for at times it resembled the game 'British Bulldog' I used to play as a boy scout.

Feast Sunday started with the cycle ride to Ely, which looked wonderful in the sunshine. Later the Treasure Hunt around the village started with a search for older buildings and other points of interest. We must apologise that, for the very first time in many years, there was no concert on the Green by a Salvation Army Band. It was cancelled at the last minute for reasons beyond our control. The band did perform in the church in the evening.

The final weekend started with a 70s/80s disco, I believe the audience would not let the DJ go home until the early hours. On Saturday Willingham Youth Trust held a very successful family Disco and the Feast finished with Willingham Wine Club's wine quiz, nearly 70 people tasted large amounts of wine over the course of four hours and the event ended with dancing to the excellent band 'Word of Mouth.' The Feast takes place early in October, watch out for events next year!

WILLINGHAM BOWLS CLUB

We have had a very successful year with 38 members, 4 under 16's and completed over 60 matches, quite remarkable really as we only had 9 members last year, no home green and all our matches were played at Longstanton Bowls Club who generously allowed us to use their green. At the end of last season the few members we had

decided to try and revive our home green, we lost it during 2015-16 due to lack of members, illness and lack of maintenance. The task was vast, the grass was over 2ft. tall and weeds everywhere. We virtually had to invest all our funds to get the green back, a local specialist flayed the grass and cut it and then we spent over £2,000 with a greens specialist who put down over 6 tonnes of topsoil and various dressings to get it back into some shape.

We had revived our green and we were now able to play on it, or so we thought. During our very dry spring and early summer our irrigation system broke down, the pump decided it had had enough. But thanks to the Fen Edge Community Association, who gave us a grant for £500, we will have it back in operation for next season.

That was not the end of our problems. During the season we noticed bare patches appearing and after advice from ProGreen and the Royal Horticultural Society we realised we had a bacteria in the green. Thanks go to our Parish Council who gave us a grant of £900 to have the green treated. We were also fortunate to receive a grant of just over £600 from South Cambs District Council to have our toilets re-vamped for next year.

So far it sounds like we had a hard year and yes we did, but helped by these generous grants and support from various local businesses including The Duke of Wellington, The PorterHouse and Vintage Holidays, plus other local businesses giving donations we have survived and look to have secured our future. We now have positive news, this year we had several open days and encouraged local people to try bowls, we supplied the equipment and instruction and I was very pleased to see many of those who tried the sport go on to join the club and play in some club matches. Bowls is a game for all ages and we are very keen to encourage the younger generation, so we offer free membership to those 16 and under. Willingham Bowls Club is not just for Willingham people it is open to everyone. It is a very enjoyable, skilful and friendly game, everyone is welcome to come and try during the season which is May until September.
