

SUSTAINABLE COTTENHAM



A new beginning – After several years operating as a working group of Cottenham Parish Council, Sustainable Cottenham's activities have become sufficiently ambitious and effective that we decided it was finally time for the group to

come of age and become a Charity. This happened officially on 25 March 2020.

One impetus for this transition was Sustainable Cottenham's involvement in supplying reusable cups at Fen Edge Community Association's (FECA's) Fen Edge Festival in June 2019. Not only did the initiative save well over 1,500 single-use plastic cups from landfill, it also provided a sizeable profit for FECA. We are building up our membership. In addition to the committee, there are members who are active in sub-groups (such as Plastic-free Cottenham and Eco Eats) and activities such as litter picks, Sunday socials, or, remotely, as our followers online. New members are always welcome!

Our first AGM was held on 9 March 2021 on Zoom. We look forward to future AGMs in person!

What happened in 2020? Following the excitement of becoming a Charity, the rest of 2020 was inevitably a disappointing year for Sustainable Cottenham, with very restricted activities. Our news of 2020 is largely the story of events we are still waiting to enjoy. We had grand plans for an Eco Eats festival in autumn 2020, to celebrate food whilst promoting sustainable diets and reduced food waste, in association with Cambridge Sustainable Food. This has been postponed until autumn 2021, or possibly 2022.

Despite the restrictions, we were able to support Cambridge Sustainable Food's Food for Our Future campaign, promoting their Food Waste Challenge online and gathering recipes and tips for ways to avoid food waste on our website.

We are hoping to be able to get back to our regular twice-yearly litter picks in 2021, and also look forward to being able to resume the Sunday Socials once restrictions are lifted.

Looking forward – We are keen to hear from anyone interested in helping to set up or join a biodiversity sub-group. We want to look at what more we can do locally to support our natural assets and their key role in combating climate change.

Plastic drinks bottles are always a large part of what is collected on litter picks. After the next village litter pick, we are planning to review the pickings to work out which brands of drinks are most commonly found. Which will be the biggest offenders? Environmental groups such as Surfers Against Sewage are increasingly trying to put pressure on big corporations to take responsibility for their plastic pollution. Plastic pollution has never been an issue of consumer responsibility alone.

COTTENHAM VILLAGE SOCIETY Cottenham Ponds

Following the heavy rains over the winter I wondered about the function of ponds today and in the past.

What was the role of ponds in the past? Some ponds were artificial and were originally dug for marl (a lime-rich clay spread on fields to reduce acidity) or some other form of quarrying. They were used as sources of water for livestock, as fishponds, and as ponds with industrial uses. Nowadays tanks of water are provided in fields for the animals. Village ponds were often created for washing off working horses and wetting the wheels of carts to expand the wood. Historically the village pond may have provided fish in the Middle Ages, water for washing clothes and as a watering hole for cattle, possibly grazing on the green itself.

One pond that is still in place in Cottenham is the one in Tenison Manor. This is on the site of the moat of the manor house of Crowlands, and this could have been for protection, for status and even fish storage.

A house that once stood on the site of Cottenham Village College had a pond which still exists on the site today though the house was removed in order to build the school complex.

Many farm complexes had ponds on their properties. On the 1887 map several ponds can be seen at the back of properties: the end of the Village College land; Camps Yard which is a bit further down the High Street; the end of Church Close; and

the back of several properties on the north side of the High Street.

In Cottenham there was a pond at Saberton's corner; the junction of Lambs Lane and the High Street. We still see some flooding in this area. The pond had disappeared by at least the time of the OS map of 1887.

Ponds on common land associated with Greens were on Cottenham Green, Beach Road corner and Church Hill (Broad Lane and High Street junction). These are all visible on the 1887 map. The largest of the ponds was on the village green but in 1928 this was filled in. Cottenham green is triangular, often a sign of an area where livestock was driven overnight in the medieval period.

Chesterton rural district council minutes record on 26 November 1925 'It was resolved to instruct a surveyor to fill in the pond at Green End Cottenham at an estimated cost of £50 and that the cost would be a general charge on the district.' On 25 March 1926 the motion to fill in pond was rescinded, but the Parish council, on 24 November 1927, applied to use the pond at Green End as a dumping ground for the parish. It was agreed that un-burnable rubbish be put upon the Green End pond site and covered with earth. The residents of Cottenham could take their rubbish to the pond and by 28 March 1928 the site would be closed and filled in with earth.

The only indication of the reason for filling in the pond was the need for a hole in which to put rubbish. There is no mention anywhere of the pond being a health hazard. The pond was needed less for the horse drawn wagons to immerse their wheels to maintain the fit. It was the beginning of the mechanised age for transport. The other factor was increase in consumerism and therefore increase in waste and the need for somewhere to put it. A dig was carried out on a small part of the ex-pond area as part of a Fen Edge Festival. Some of the objects such as glass (bottles), metal (bicycle frame) that were retrieved from the trench could have been recycled. Presumably there was no need to do so in the 1920s – unlike today!



This will now become our second home and provide us with much-needed extra pitches. Next on our agenda is the improvement of Winter training facilities; we are grateful to The Football Foundation for a grant towards the purchase of a set of floodlights to enable this. We are also very grateful to FECA, who donated the balance required to obtain this large grant. Our committee continues to work with Cambridgeshire FA and The Football Foundation to extend the 3G Astro surface at the college but we are competing for funding with many of our neighbouring clubs, such as our good friends at Over, to improve these much sought after facilities. Given our very wet winters lately, investment in all-weather 5v5, 7v7, 9v9 and IIvII pitches would be a dream come true!



We are continuing to run our two adult men's teams, a 1st team in the Kershaw Senior A League and a Reserve side in the Kershaw Division 3B League. A delayed 2020/21 season started way back in September and we were just getting into things when we had a month's enforced break for the lockdown in November. The 1st team then got off to a decent restart in December with a draw away at the League leaders. But the season soon came to yet another abrupt halt with the January lockdown. As I write, the Government has just given the go-ahead for grassroots football to start again from March 29th. The season may possibly be extended into May, or even June, or it may simply be declared void because of the difficulty of fitting in all the remaining games. We must wait until we get some indication of the way ahead from the Cambridgeshire Football Association (FA).

Even the limited season we have had would not have been possible without the help, advice and encouragement we've received from the Cambs FA and the Parish Council. It gave a massive boost to the physical and mental well-being of everyone connected with the Red and Blacks family simply being able to play some football in these extremely abnormal times. And, of course, everyone is raring to get going again as soon as we get the chance!

Training sessions for both squads were taking place weekly with the 1st team training on the outdoor, allweather surface at Northstowe College, 8.15-9.30pm on Tuesday evenings and the Reserves on the similar outdoor facilities at Cottenham Village College, 8-9pm on Wednesdays. We haven't been able to do this since before Christmas but we may now be able to restart after 29 March. However, as we move out of winter, and certainly by the time you are reading this, these training arrangements will very likely have changed so please check out with us what's happening. All are most welcome to join us at training and you can be assured of a very friendly reception. So please do come along if you're interested in playing. COTTENHAM CARECAR

Cottenham Carecar is one of about 60 village social car schemes operating in Cambridgeshire. In normal time it is also the busiest.

Formed in 1994 and originally known as the Doctors' Car Service, the aim is to provide mobility to those people in the village who, through age, infirmity, illness or isolation, are unable to use public transport. They operate in areas where public transport is limited and where taxis are not locally available or an affordable option. Even in a large village like Cottenham, those who cannot walk more than 50 yards can easily become housebound and socially deprived.

As time went by, the decision was made to include social journeys as well as medical and to change the name to Cottenham Carecar.

Nowadays, approximately 50% of the journeys undertaken are Medical and the rest essential Social, shopping, visiting etc.

In recent, normal, years, the scheme covers Oakington and Westwick until such time as they are included in a Northstowe scheme.

From 2016 to 2019 the average annual mileage covered was 43,000, and the average number of journeys was 2,400, at 196 per month.

Currently, because of Covid-19, a dedicated five drivers (my Fabulous Few!) are doing only urgent medical including Vaccination appointments, under strict Covid rules. Thirteen other drivers are still having to isolate.

Hopefully, it will not be long before normal service is resumed.

COTTENHAM FUN RUN

When the decision to postpone the Cottenham Fun Run was taken at the start of the pandemic it was with high hopes that the event would still go ahead during 2020. Fast forward the best part of a year and the 2020 Fun Run medals still sit in a box awaiting necks to adorn.

Virtual events have now become common place. The virtual London Marathon, for example, being awarded a Guinness World Record for the most participants to run a remote marathon in 24 hours. Not to be left out, a just-for-fun, virtual Fun Run was arranged to give the Cottenham running community the chance to take on the established 7k Cottenham route.

COTTENHAM GARDENERS CLUB

The Socially Distant Gardener - by Ken Ellis

Well, here we are. I'm writing this at the beginning of February, but you'll be reading it sometime around late spring. By now, hopefully, you'll be heading out into your garden and/or allotment and tending the growing plants. It would be easy to tell you what to do in your garden now, but you'll get that advice in many places elsewhere. Let's instead look at things that will enhance your understanding of plants, and, hopefully, help you when you buy and plant them.

Many of us, including those without access to gardens of their own, will have learnt the gentle art of the Recreational Walk. We have visited parts of Ely that previously were either unexplored territory, or places that we drove past to get somewhere else. We've discovered patches of waste land, rich in brambles, scrub and wildlife. country park walks, and the planting on new estates. Near you will be the same, go and explore, but go with a gardener's eyes. Have a good look at a hedgerow. Note the way that wild roses climb through other plants bearing flowers on stems that seek the light. An idea for that blank high fence perhaps? Note that some plants flower early, before the trees shade them. If you have a tree with a dead patch round it, do the same. Go for early flowering bulbs and plants, such as early flowering primulas, snowdrops and cyclamen. For later flowers, plant foxgloves. They like the shade, and happily self-seed. For those people who home school, you can tick off large parts of the curriculum with the walk. Engage the unsuspecting child with open questions - how would you describe that colour? Why do you think that's growing there?

Another advantage of the Recreational Walk is that you will pass other front gardens. Without being judgemental, look at how people express themselves with the patch that you can see. The most quirky thing that I've seen was a fireman's helmet plonked under a window. As it drew your eye, you noticed the occupant of the sheltered bungalow looking at you and giving you a cheery wave. The humour shared between us was mutually beneficial. In most cases, quirky things in front

gardens will be entertaining, but you have to be wise about sad things like security.

Something that you could consider, and would be suitable for all, is to grow something that you haven't grown before. I have an alpine house, and have to be careful about pests, especially little white flies. I hit on the happy idea of growing a range of carnivorous plants in there. Exit bugs. I was surprised how easy to grow, and how hardy, some of them are. I recommend the faithful Venus flytrap and sundew as the best bug removers. All you have to do is to put their pots in a largish plant saucer and keep it topped up with water. Why? I read that in the wild, they live in mainly peaty bogs, hence the need to trap insects for nutrients.

So, when you go out and about, look around you, notice what would perhaps normally be the backdrop for the supermarket run, and take a lesson in planting. If you go to a garden centre, look at plants for sale in an area that you don't normally visit. Find out what's there, how and where they like to grow, and have a go. This is not restricted to adults; most adults that I know as gardeners started in their early days. Grow runner bean seeds in jars, mustard and cress, set up a small patch, even in a seed tray, and grow flowering plants.

Above all, become a child yourself, and enjoy the wonder of nature, as you look at plants, enjoy their colours and (with luck) eat some of their fruit.

historic Church.

The old window at All Saints' had long been in need of total restoration, and the project became possible during 2020 thanks to very generous support from within the village for the Friends of All Saints' Church Rampton Action Group. The group is a long-standing

supporter of All Saints' and consists of church and nonchurch members alike who share an interest in the wonderful medieval Church building. Work started in July 2020 and was completed in time for Christmas. The project involved the careful removal of the old structure in its entirety and rebuilding of the window using a blend of restored elements of the original with substantial new carved

stonework. The craftsmen were able to retain many panes from the original historic glass as well as the Y tracery stonework which separates the two main lights of the window. The finished window is an accomplished and durable combination of the old and the new.

Visitors to the Church can see the restored window at any time – the Church is open most days and everyone is welcome.



FECA IN WILLINGHAM

WILLINGHAM ACTION GROUP

Willingham Action Group (WAG) adopted Promoting Sustainability as a new project in 2019, with the aim of highlighting environmental problems to raise awareness locally and also taking what action we could as individuals. Since then, we have seen media coverage increase significantly as more and more people realise the dangers posed. There are increasing resources available and many new initiatives from groups such as Willingham Parish Council, the District and County Councils and many other local and national environmental groups. It is humbling to see those dedicating their lives to combatting climate change. Here's Greta Thunberg speaking at the UN Climate Conference in 2018 (at the age of fifteen!):

For twenty-five years countless numbers of people have stood in front of the UN Climate Conferences asking our nations' leaders to stop the emissions, but clearly this has not worked as the emissions continue to rise. So, I will not ask them anything, instead I will ask people around the world to realise that our political leaders have failed us because we are facing an existential threat. The people will rise to the challenge, we will have to take responsibility.

So now we are seeing this happen and the hope must be that if we each take some responsibility and do something, no matter how small, we might save the planet and ourselves. We reported our plans in the last issue, here is an update.

WAG action against overuse of plastics

We delivered leaflets to every house in the village asking residents to take the plastics pledge promising to reduce their household plastics consumption. It's been quite successful, with the number taking part growing each week; we set up a Google group for the 'pledgers' where we all share useful tips on ways to reduce our use of plastics. Because of the pandemic, we have made limited contact with local groups with the same aims. We were happy to find out that there are two groups nearby that operate refill shops where you can take your empty plastic containers for liquid soap, cleansers, shampoo, etc. and get them topped up, thus saving on the constant purchase and disposal of the very many containers most of

us have in our houses. Once the pandemic allows, we plan to develop links to work with other likeminded groups.

At the time of writing, we have just had a Zoom meeting with members of our group, some of the pledgers and with Jonathon Crisp who works for our County Council as their Recycling Education Manager. The aim of the meeting was to pick Jon's brain on issues around recycling. We are most grateful for his time and we learned a lot. We were informed that within Cambridgeshire only 56% of household material is recycled properly so there is much room for improvement but also that, before we target recycling, we should first think about reduction, reuse and repair.

Impact food production has on the **environment** – About one third of total global greenhouse gas emissions are due to food production, from seed to supermarket shelf. Of course, the actual damage to the environment depends on which food. Ikg of potatoes contributes the equivalent of 0.3 kg of carbon dioxide to the atmosphere while Ikg of chicken contributes 3.8kg and 1kg of British beef 25kg. To take up Greta Thunberg's challenge we must change our eating habits. People can help by eating less meat, buying local produce locally and reducing food waste. This is such an important issue that the Government set up the Waste and Resources Action Programme. Estimates relating to the UK suggest about 4.5 million tonnes of edible food are thrown away each year and world-wide about one third of all food produced is wasted. Considering that producing food adds to global greenhouse gases, as noted above, if the wasted food was a country it would be the third highest polluter of all countries in the world!

There's lots more to be done in the coming year. We have started discussions with the councillors in Willingham with responsibility for Sustainability about the parish carbon footprint and how we might help. Our Parish Council has already taken action to reduce heating costs in parish buildings and are looking at carbon footprint calculations. The District Council held a Climate and Environment Fortnight for a variety of audiences

within our District. We plan to hold our first Repair Café in May if Covid-19 restrictions allow. WILLINGHAM GARDENING CLUB

At the time of writing, it is not known how the government's roadmap out of lockdown and any further restrictions will impact on the Willingham Gardening Club. As many of our members fall into either the over 70s, or shielded groups, it may be some while before our members feel happy to, or indeed are allowed to, meet indoors. Our usual meeting venue is the Willingham Social Club, Fen End, on the first Monday in every month at 7.30pm, when we would usually have a speaker on a topic of interest to our members. In the meantime, here are a few snippets of interest and jobs in the garden to do over the next few months.

Deadhead Spring bulbs - Promptly remove faded flower heads from spring-flowering bulbs to stop them wasting energy by developing unwanted seed heads. Some bulbs can be left to set seed and spread naturally, including crocus, cyclamen, erythronium, fritillaria and snowdrops. Bulbs need adequate water while in growth, and for six weeks after flowering. Improve soil condition in beds and borders in early spring. To encourage flowering, apply a general-purpose fertilizer. When feeding bulbs in containers use a high potassium liquid fertilizer in early spring. Leave bulb foliage to die down for a minimum of six weeks. Lift and replant in summer. Many tulip varieties don't re-flower unless lifted. Allow foliage to die down, lift carefully and clean bulbs, discard damaged and diseased bulbs. Let them dry before storing in paper bags or nets in a

cool, dry place. Replant in the autumn. Some dwarf species tulips (e.g., Tulipa kaufmanniana, T. fosteriana, T. greigii and T. sprengeri) are perennial.

Prune for next winter – winter flowering shrubs (e.g., sarcococcas, daphnes, winter flowering viburnums, winter jasmine, forsythia, flowering currants, weigela and lonicera fragrantissima) are coming to the end of their flowering season. Pruning now will give the shrub time to put on new growth on which next year's flowers will form. Cut a few stems down to ground level to encourage growth from the base of the shrub. Finally, cut back the stems that flowered to healthy new shoots.

Protect against slugs and snails – now is the time to be watchful. New shoots and tender seedlings are particularly vulnerable to slug and snail predation. So, prioritise barriers against them where the plants are just sprouting. Stop slugs and snails reaching young shoots in pots.

Flowers fresh for the picking – the first thing to look for is cut-and-come-again flowers, annuals, biennials and bulbs, which will keep producing more blooms the more you pick them. Opt for the ones with a long flowering season, but also aim to get as long a cutting season as possible by choosing a mixture of early and later flowering plants. Many cut flowers are good for wildlife, or are scented or edible. Here are some suggestions: marigolds, stocks, cornflower, cosmos, bishop's flower, lilium, freesia, gladiolus, zinnia and dahlia.

Take your pick – pick flowers in the morning if possible, when their stems are full of water and they are not under stress from the heat of the day. Otherwise wait until evening. Use clean, sharp secateurs or a knife and cut a generous stem, at an angle, just above a leaf joint. Make sure you cause the flowers as little stress as possible, by taking a bucket of cold water with you and dropping the cut stems into it as soon as they are picked. More importantly, keep on picking – the more you harvest, the more flowers you will get.

THE WILLINGHAM LOVE HUB

Covid-19 Support Group

The Willingham Village Facebook page began life in March 2014, set up by a villager as a much-needed online presence and a rallying point if the community ever faced significant challenge. Cue Coronavirus - and the Willingham Love Hub was born, with the Facebook page administrators serving as its initiators and chief coordinators.

Willingham was divided into ten zones, each with two zone reps to share the responsibility of delegating volunteers (over 100 put their name forward!) to assist shielding Willingham residents. An army of distributors delivered Love Hub leaflets to over 1.900 households. providing information and the dedicated rep phone numbers. To ensure everyone

in the community was reached, Love Hub information was also shared on the Facebook page as well as the Willingham News. While the desk role of zone rep was open to everyone, including those who were shielding or self isolating, it was vital that the volunteers (known as members) could carry out practical tasks such as shopping, picking up prescriptions and other errands. Their efforts and the close contacts forged led to real friendships across the generations.

A strategic partnership was formed between representatives of the Parish Council, the District Council, the County Council and local agencies, including Willingham Primary School, Willingham Medical Practice, Willingham Pharmacy, Over Day Centre and Willingham Co-op, with regular meetings being held online, ably chaired by one of the Love Hub organisers.

With the support of Willingham Action Group (WAG) and FECA, an online payment system was set up to allow villagers to transfer funds into an online account, from which volunteers were reimbursed the cost of shopping etc. However, cash,

> prepaid cards and personal trust soon took over, with payments flowing frictionfree between villager and member.

Recently, after over 300 errands executed in the course of 2020, the system has been scaled down to 5 zone reps and around 20 members, with personal relationships (many of them

new) proving sufficient to service those still in need. However, the problem of poverty is now beginning to surface, and Willingham has now established its own emergency food bank, again initiated by the Facebook/Love Hub administrators and operated by a WAG volunteer.

All those involved in the Willingham Love Hub as zone reps and members, and those operating and supporting the food bank deserve the highest praise and gratitude, with admiration unlimited going to the administrators whose efforts and fortitude are difficult to properly convey in words.

WILLINGHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Flooding – Over the Christmas period and New Year, some areas of the village were subjected to flooding. The Council has been liaising with Cambridge County Council and Anglian Water to try and resolve the issues. Many parishioners have been affected by the flooding and, following a well-attended Council meeting on 3 February, the Council are trying to bring all parties together so that a resolution can be found.

Facilities – Although the halls are closed and the football teams are not allowed to play at the moment, we have still been working in the background ready for when things can return to normal.

The Council has recently had two table tennis tables installed on the QEII Field, which, I am sure, will be enjoyed by adults and children alike once the warmer weather returns. We are also in the process of having a covered cycle parking area installed for those who wish to access the facilities on bikes.

We were lucky enough to be awarded a grant from South Cambridgeshire District Council's Zero Carbon Community Grant and this along with some \$106 monies will see a new heating system installed in the Ploughman Hall. The infrared heating will be more economical to run and will hopefully provide a more pleasant environment for user groups.

Elections – These are due to be held on Thursday 6 May and at the time of writing are still scheduled to go ahead. The Parish Council is made up of 15 seats and both existing councillors and residents wishing to apply to become a councillor can find more information at

Donation of Barton's Field – A new recreational amenity for the enjoyment of villagers has been donated to the Parish Council.

Walkers and well-behaved dogs are welcome to explore and use the field, although it must be emphasised that access is via Blackpit Drove which is a private droveway and should not be used by cars. The fields behind are also private, so please do not exit from the far end.



The Field is approximately 2 acres and is on the north-west side of Blackpit Drove. It was once one of many dedicated to growing flowers for sale. The name was suggested by the gentleman

donating the land who said "I bought the field from Douglas Barton. His declaration in 1986 explains that he acquired the land from his father, Donald Barton in 1974 who, in turn acquired it from his father, Charles Barton in 1952. Charles acquired the land in 1937. So, the Barton family had the land for nearly 50 years. When I bought the field in 1986, it was planted with what we called *Demosa* (Statice) and Delphiniums."

The Field is now laid to grass with a small wood top and bottom and planted with an assortment of fruit and smaller trees in the centre. There is a central path winding through and a straight path back down the northern side.

The Parish Council would like to express their gratitude on behalf of the whole village, for this generous donation.

Council meetings – are generally held on the first Wednesday of the month in the Octagon, starting at 7.30pm (meetings are currently being held remotely via Zoom). Agendas are published on the website, the notice board outside the public hall in the High Street, and in the Library. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions (see agendas for further details).

LAPTOPS AND TABLETS FOR HOME-SCHOOLERS

You may decry the advent of the internet and the power of social media, but harnessed in the right way, it can be a real force for good. So it was when Graham Mumby of FECA and Willingham Action Group (WAG) sent out a couple of messages asking if it might be a good idea for WAG, FECA and Willingham School Association (WSA) to fill the gap in the supply of laptops and tablets to home-

schoolers. Links were forged with Willingham Primary School, Cottenham Village College and Councillor Gemma Bailey as a key Cottenham coordinator, and the idea was well received. In Willingham, Marie Clements of WSA put out feelers, posters and Facebook messages, Paul Knighton of WAG provided the collection point, Les Hambly and Martin Smith served as the device cleaner-uppers and Henry Audley-Charles brought in a couple of invaluable and encouraging early contributions as well as providing further support.

In the end, some 33 devices were collected on the Willingham side – all donated by local people freely and in good faith. Some were uprated, others a bit too old but good as sources of additional RAM. Schools require Windows 10 these days, as we found out half way through the project, although webcapable tablets were generally welcome as lesson receiver devices.

The government also delivered on its promise with a batch of 25 new laptops for Willingham Primary School, preceded by a similar number donated by a local Willingham business. Someone even kindly offered £300 as a donation, and the need, as of the time of writing, has quickly become less acute.

In Cottenham, residents were equally generous, donating 40 devices to the effort led by the village Covid Support Team. A small number did not meet the schools' specifications and these were securely erased and donated to the Cambridgeshire Youth Panel for use in their laptop refurbishment scheme. The remainder were wiped and refurbished by David Bailey, replacing various switches, keyboards and power supplies with funds raised by the Covid Support Team. The laptops were all then upgraded to Windows 10, to meet the schools' requirements. Further support came from the Histon and Impington initiative, led by Colin and Anya Myles, which donated a surplus of rebuilt devices to the team. This brought to 44 the total number of devices the team was able to supply to Cottenham schools.

The network that Graham spawned quickly grew as the virtual tentacles spread to more and more helpers and donors, and the results were very encouraging – not just in terms of this response but also with respect to possible future initiatives.

STITCHWILD

Like most groups in the Fen Edge region, StitchWild has put face to face meetings on hold. That doesn't mean that we have put our stitching on hold! Most members have continued creating at home, using the internet and social media to share their work. Zoom workshops, WhatsApp groups, subscription-based groups and projects-in-a-box by post have all been instrumental in keeping us learning and sharing. In fact, sharing via the internet and social media has led to a movement called 'craftivism', a term coined by Betsy Greer in her book *Craftivism*.

Craftivism describes a worldwide movement that operates at the intersection of craft and activism. But despite the inherently political definition of the term 'activism', craftivism doesn't push any specific political agenda – it simply accounts for the tangible influence that any socially engaged crafting can have on the world. According to Greer, the very essence of craftivism lies in creating something that gets people to ask questions; we invite others to join a conversation about the social and political intent of our creations. It turns us, as well as our work, into vessels of change.' More than anything, it is a humanitarian movement to make an impact on others. It can be used to address social issues, such as the many works produced during Covid lockdown, encouraging the wearing of face coverings, the importance of looking after others, gratitude to the NHS, making face coverings for hospitals workers; or something as simple as knitting scarves and mittens and leaving them on fences and trees for anyone in need to take and use. Even tiny bird's nests have been knitted and donated to bird rescue groups. These examples are all craftivism at work! And here are examples of craftivism by our members:





THE FARMLAND MUSEUM AND DENNY ARREY

The Farmland Museum and Denny Abbey is a new member of the Fen Edge Community Association but certainly not new to the Fens; Denny Abbey has been on the site near Waterbeach since 1159! Located just off the A10, north of Waterbeach, the Farmland Museum and Denny Abbey offers a

tranquil space in which to appreciate the beauty of the Fens and learn about the history of this part of rural Cambridgeshire.

The buildings and exhibits tell an 850-year story of farming and rural life in the Cambridgeshire Fens, until the rapid changes brought about by mechanisation in the mid-20th century changed a way of life forever.

Denny Abbey (see front cover), an English Heritage property, is an architectural delight. Visitors can observe how it has been carefully deconstructed to show evidence of the three religious orders who lived there, and its subsequent life as a farmhouse.



The Village Shop

The Farmland Museum – housed in converted farm buildings next to Denny Abbey – presents opportunities to learn about Fenland trades and crafts, historic farming machinery, life in a 1940s farmworker's cottage and village shop, and to see how food was produced from the rich soils of the Fens.



There's plenty for the younger members of the family too with an outdoor play area and, once Covid-19 measures are relaxed, we'll see the return of the ever-popular *Playshed* with ride-on tractors, farmyard toys, and there are interactive exhibits and activities across the site.

The museum is open seasonally, usually from April until October. 2021 is going to be a little different. The earliest the museum can reopen (at time of writing) is 17 May. We are fortunate, however, to have large grounds and gardens for exercise, so we expect to be able to open these – and our café for takeaway – in time for the Easter holidays at the end of March.

Although we might be closed, we are still sharing our collection online. With over 10,000 Fenland objects, our collection is vast and varied. In our blog (see our website) you can read about all sorts of things from doing the laundry or caring for tractors, to catching eels!

Our museum is run by a very small team of staff with support from lots of wonderful volunteers. We are always on the lookout for more. Volunteers look after our collection, clean and maintain the buildings, welcome visitors and deliver tours. Our children's activities are all volunteer-led. The beautiful cottage garden and allotment are managed by volunteers. If there's a job to be done, you can usually find it being done by a volunteer! FEN EDGE ORCHESTRA

Fen Edge Orchestra is a friendly, amateur orchestra which was formed over 10 years ago. It has traditionally rehearsed in Cottenham Village College on Wednesdays during term times. Members come from Cottenham itself, but also from the surrounding villages, as well as Cambridge and even further afield.

Evan Turner directs the orchestra. The standard has improved steadily over the past few years. Two concerts a year are given — usually a winter concert in the warm and pleasant surroundings of Histon Baptist Church, and a summer concert in Cottenham Parish Church, where there is always an enthusiastic welcome.

The orchestra performs a varied menu of music; classics, such as Beethoven and Haydn symphonies, some early music, and some more contemporary repertoire. A lighter programme is usually devised for the biennial Fen Edge Festival.

There are no auditions to join the orchestra. Many members arrive after a long break from playing, or when they are learning an instrument and have reached the stage when they are ready to play with other people.
